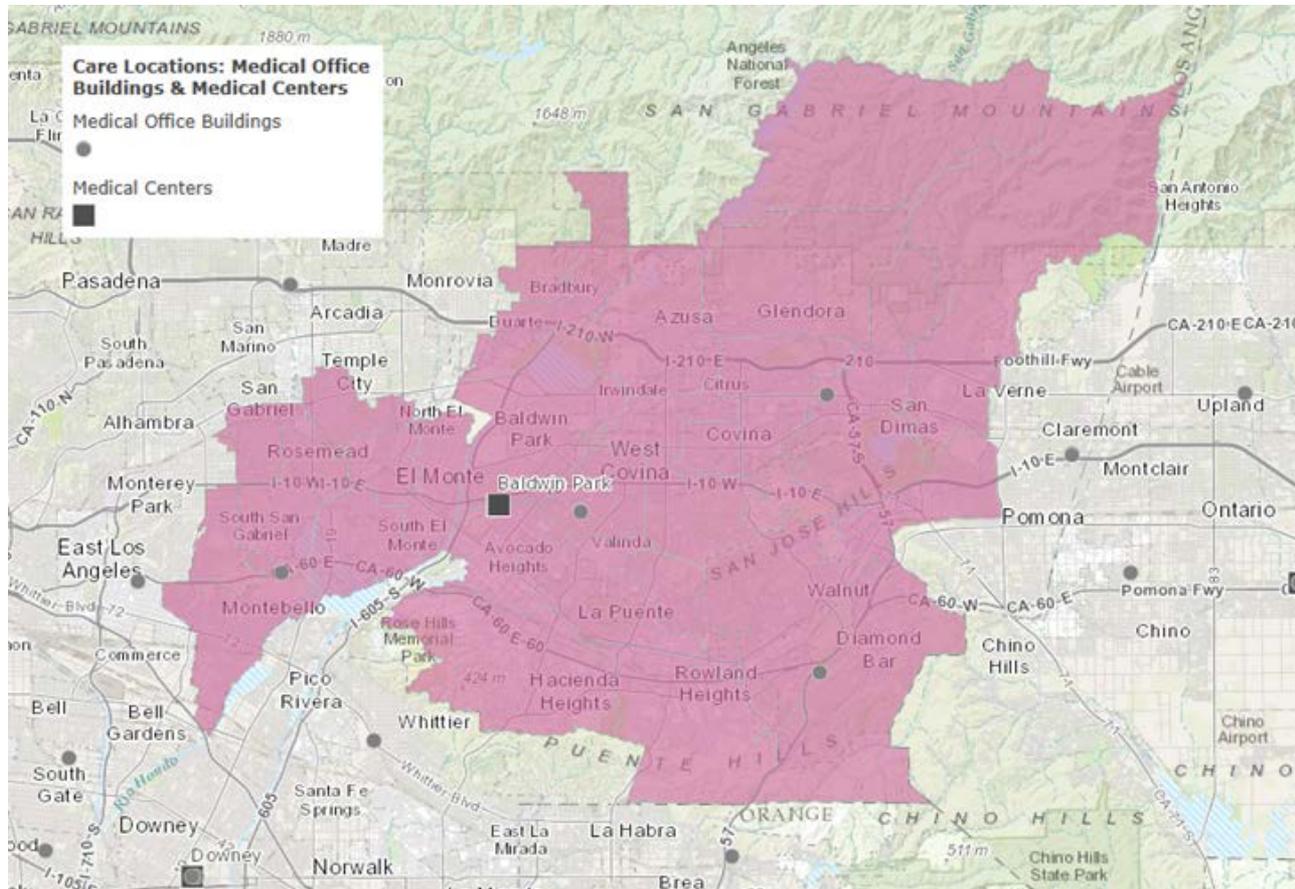

Community Benefit Investment

- **In 2016, Kaiser Permanente:**
 - Invested over \$930 million in Southern California
 - Invested over \$18 million in the Baldwin Park Service Area
- **In 2017, KP Baldwin Park:**
 - Awarded 33 grants totaling \$288,000 in support of funding priorities identified in the Community Health Needs Assessment
- **In 2018, KP Baldwin Park:**
 - Will offer grant funding in support of funding priorities identified in the Community Health Needs Assessment

2016 Community Health Needs Assessment and Implementation Strategy Plan

Baldwin Park Medical Center Community Health Needs Assessment

- In 1994, the California State Legislature enacted Senate Bill 697 (SB 697) requiring non-profit hospitals to conduct a community health needs assessment (CHNA) every three years. The CHNA is also now a requirement for compliance with IRS tax exempt status.
- The CHNA process is designed to develop a deeper understanding of community health care needs and inform hospitals' community benefit plans for outreach and services that complement and extend clinical services, to address disease prevention and improve health status.
- 2016 CHNA used to establish all of Baldwin Park Medical Center's Community Benefit funding priorities for 2017–2019

2017-2019 Funding Priorities

- **Access to Care** – programs that support access to timely, coordinated, high quality health care including preventive care and specialty care.
- **Economic Security** – programs that support improved economic security, including access to employment, educational and housing opportunities, and affordable fresh food.
- **Mental and Behavioral Health** – programs that promote positive mental health and support the knowledge, capacity, and infrastructure of organizations that address mental and behavioral health.
- **Obesity/Healthy Eating Active Living (HEAL)/Diabetes** – programs that support healthy eating and physical activity to reduce obesity and the onset or complications from associated chronic conditions such as diabetes and heart disease.

2018 Community Benefit Grants Program

Eligibility

5.1.4 Organizations Eligible to Receive Charitable Contributions. The following types of organizations are eligible for charitable contributions from KFHP/H:

5.1.4.1 Tax exempt organizations noted in Internal Revenue Code §509(a), including those designated §501(c)(3).

5.1.4.2 Local, state, or federal government agencies, and their subdivisions, that perform substantial governmental functions, when the contribution is made solely for public purposes.

5.1.4.3 Other Tax-Exempt Organizations. Other tax-exempt organizations (i.e., §501(c)(4), §501(c)(5), etc.) not listed above may be eligible to receive support under certain circumstances. The National Community Benefit Department provides guidance when these circumstances arise.

5.1.5 Organizations Not Eligible to Receive Charitable Contributions. Any organization that discriminates on the basis of sex, gender identity, age, socioeconomic status, education, race, color, ethnicity, ancestry, national origin, sexual orientation, marital status, culture, citizenship, immigration status, religion, veteran status, and/or physical or mental disability in its programs, services, policies, and/or administration is an excluded organization ineligible to receive charitable contributions.

Eligibility

In addition, organizations must:

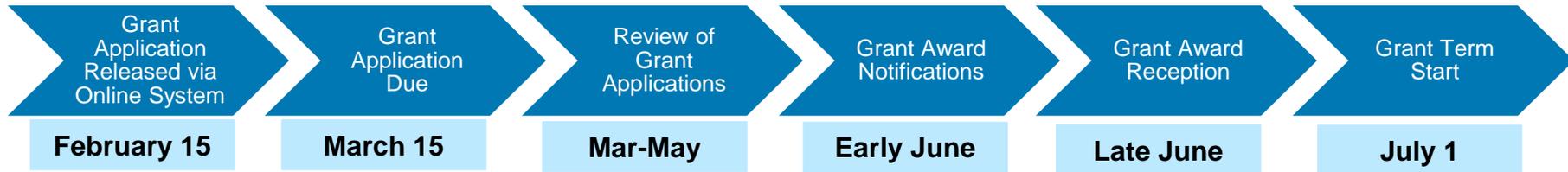
- Provide program/services that addresses funding priorities identified in the Community Health Needs Assessment
- Provide services within the geographic boundaries of Kaiser Permanente Baldwin Park Service Area
- Must be in “Good Standing” by submitting all required documents, progress (if required), and/or final reports in a timely manner for all previous Kaiser Permanente grants

Restrictions

Kaiser Permanente Baldwin Park Medical Center Community Benefit will generally not consider funding request from international, social or recreational clubs, or for the following:

- Sport teams and tournaments (e.g., golf, tennis, walks, and runs)
- Individuals
- Religious purposes
- Partisan political activities
- Endowments or memorials
- Capital building
- Re-granting purposes to other organizations
- Professional Associations/affiliations events
- Sorority or Fraternity Community events
- Capital campaigns
- Any organization that discriminates on the basis of sex, color, age, religion, disability or sexual orientation

Online Grant Application

Grant Award Parameters and Considerations

Grants are provided on a one year basis and range from \$5,000 to \$25,000. Due to limited resources, requests are typically funded in the range of \$5,000 to \$15,000. All requests should align strongly with funding priority areas and should only include support for specific health projects/programs that will produce a measurable impact.

Funding Timeline

- Applications must be submitted before 2:00pm on March 15, 2018
- Kaiser Permanente will announce grant awards by July 2018

NOTE: Only one (1) application will be accepted per organization per cycle

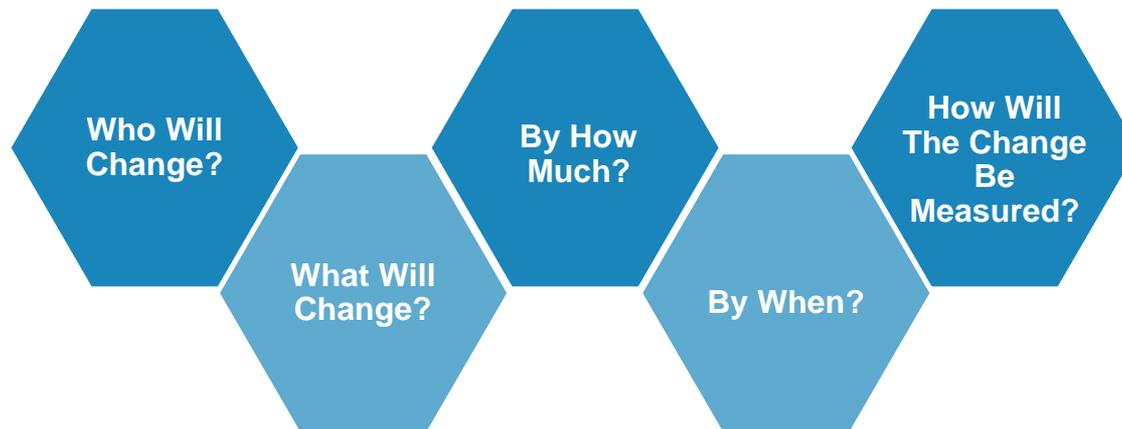
Objectives

- List primary objectives for the program
- Similar to goals – generalized intention of the program
- Should specify the result of an activity
- Should identify your target population and/or community
- Realistic and accomplishable within grant period and funding request



Outcomes and Measures of Success

- Specific, measurable statements that let you know when you have reached your goals
- Describe specific changes in knowledge, attitude, skills, and behaviors you expect as a result of the program
- Realistic and accomplishable within grant period and funding request



Elements of a Strong Proposal

- Project aligns with funding priority, implementation strategies and service area
- Specific, measurable, action-oriented and time-defined objectives
- Expected outcomes are specific and measurable
- Project include other funders besides Kaiser Permanente
- Project has a sustainability plan
- Collaboration and formal partnerships with other organizations
- Leveraging existing initiatives and resources
- Evaluations and reports (submitted from previous years)

Tips

- Apply early!
- Do not wait until the last day!
- Measurable, specific objectives and outcomes
- Clear activities and measures of success
- Board of Directors on letterhead with Professional Affiliations
- Cover letter on letterhead must show physical mailing address (No PO boxes)
- Budget align to the programs and services being proposed
